

Good News!

Childhood daydreams come peppered with visions of heroes and heroines, movie stars and rock stars, fame and notoriety. Eventually, however, we adjust our visions of what we can become as we are confronted by the reality of who we are. Seldom, however, are our daydreams and visions big enough. They tend to be only about ourselves, barely including others.

The same may be said about becoming people of faith. Too readily we think of faith simply as our personal decision to believe in God. Faith then becomes one-sided—the prayers we say, the Masses we attend, the Church's rules we obey. Like the people of the prophet Habakkuk's day, we may bemoan, "I cry for help and you do not listen.... [I] cry out to you, 'Violence!' and you do not intervene" (Habakkuk 1:2).

Then, too, our faith and its vision for life are not big enough, for we do not allow room for God to slip into our lives and do what God does. Then, faith is only about ourselves—our needs and struggles and pains. Faith needs to be a surrender to God's vision, not simply for ourselves, but for all of life. [The Lord said,] "The vision is a witness for the appointed time...it will not disappoint. If it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late" (Habakkuk 2:3). The difficulty is that we want God to make life perfect for us the way we want it and when we want it. Then, it becomes our vision for life and not God's.

Devotions, Explained! There are many variations of the Morning Offering, but all share the same purpose: to begin each day by offering oneself to God, along with all the experiences, struggles and blessings that the day will bring. The ancient Israelites practiced the bikkurim ("first fruits") as described in Deuteronomy, chapter 26. This was a ritual by which the first fruits of the harvest were offered back to God in a sacrificial act of gratitude and obedience. The theology behind the Morning Offering is similar: giving to God the first moments of each day. The most traditional form of the Morning Offering, attributed to Fr. François-Xavier Gautrelet, begins "O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer you my prayers, works, joys, and sufferings of this day, for all the intentions of your Sacred Heart, in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the world, for the salvation of souls, the reparation of sins, the reunion of all Christians, and in particular for the intentions of the Holy Father. Did You Know? Although Christmas is still three months away, September 28 is the Feast of Saint Wenceslas – the same king remembered in the popular Christmas carol. Wenceslas ruled Bohemia and was known as a faithful Christian ruler who cared for the poor and worked to spread Christianity throughout his kingdom. May his example remind us that true greatness is found in serving others with faith and generosity.

STEMM (science, technology, engineering, math and medicine) is being introduced at St. John Central. Developing young minds for the future.

Talking with God and His Saints. One of the most important activities for a Catholic is prayer. Without it there can be no true spiritual life. Through personal prayer and the communal prayer of the Church, especially the Mass, we worship and praise God, we express sorrow for our sins, and we intercede on behalf of others (1 Tim 2:1-4). Through prayer we grow in our relationship with Christ and with members of God's family. This family includes all members of the Church whether on earth, in heaven, or in purgatory. Since Jesus has only one body, and since death has no power to separate us from Christ. Christians who are in heaven, or who are entering heaven are being purified in purgatory by God's love, are still part of the Body of Christ.

Jesus said the second greatest commandment is to "love your neighbor as yourself". Those in heaven love us more intently than they ever could have loved us while on earth. They pray for us constantly and their prayers are powerful. Our prayers to the saints in heaven asking for their prayers for us and their intercession with the Father do not undermine Christ's role as mediator. In asking saints in heaven to pray for us we follow Paul's instructions "I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all men," for "this is good, and acceptable in his sight of God our Savior." (1Tim 2:1-3). All members of the Body of Christ are called to help one another through prayer, Mary's prayers are especially effective on our behalf because of her relationship with he Son (John2:1-11). God gave Mary a special role. He saved her from all sin, made her uniquely blessed among all women and made her a model for all Christians. At the end of her life he took her body and soul into heaven -an image of our own resurrection at the end of the world (Rev. 12:1-2).

What is the purpose of life? The old catechism asked, "Why did God make you?" The answer: "God made me to know him, to love him, and serve him in this world and to be happy with him forever in the next." Here in just 26 words is the whole reason for our existence. Jesus answered the question even more briefly: "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10) God's plan for you is simple. Your loving Father wants to give you all good things—especially eternal life. Jesus died on the cross to save us all from sin and eternal separation from God that sin causes. When he saves us, he makes us part of his Body, which is the Church. We thus become united with him and with Christians everywhere (on earth, in heaven, in purgatory).

An Unbroken History Jesus said his Church would be "the light of the world." He then noted that "a city set on a hill cannot be hid". This means His Church is a visible organization. It must have characteristics that clearly identify it and that distinguish it from others churches. Jesus promised, "I will build my church and the power of hell shall not prevail against it". This means the Church will never be destroyed and will never fall away from him. His Church will survive until his return. The Catholic Church is the only universal Christian Church that has existed since the time of Jesus. Every other Christian group is an offshoot of the Catholic Church. The Eastern Orthodox churches broke away from unity with the pope in 1054. The Protestant communities were established during the Refermation, which began in 1517. (Most of today's Protestant groups are actually offshoots of the original Protestant offshoots.)

Only the Catholic Church existed in the tenth century, in the fifth century, and in the first century, faithfully teaching the doctrine given by Christ to the apostles, omitting nothing. The lines of popes can be tracked back, in unbroken succession, to Peter himself. This is unequalled by any institution in history. The Catholic Church has existed for nearly 2,000 years, despite constant opposition from the world. This is testimony to the Church's divine origin. It must be more than a merely human organization, especially considering that its human members—even some of its leaders—have been unwise, corrupt, or prone to heresy.

Columbarium

The 24-niche single sided columbarium is due into Kirby Monuments first week of October. Will arrange to set in place sometime in October. This will be on the concrete ledge in front of the concrete wall where the outside service is held.

Digging Graves

A member of the parish has shown interest in opening and closing graves. He would like Howard to work with him on a few and see how it goes. He would use his own excavator along with the parish Gator and trailer.

Membership

Anyone who has membership (plot and maintenance fee) paid by October 1st opening and closing of the grave will be included. Anyone after the October 1st date, opening and closing of the grave will need to be paid at the time of service.

Headstone

Several headstones have shifted, and one has recently fallen. Families are responsible for maintenance of the headstones. If no family is available to do so, then we need to take care of it as we see need. We will get a list updated as to which one need attention and try to contact family. If anyone sees one of their family members' headstones needing attention, please look into straightening them.

Several of the smaller headstones that do not have a foundation will be straightened by volunteers. If anyone is interested in helping let us know.
