Good News!

So much of who we are is beyond our choice: our parents, our ethnic identity, our time in history, even some of our personality traits. We may not have chosen many of these basic building blocks, but we do have lots to say about what we fashion them into. We certainly are influenced by social groups such as family and neighborhood, church community and civic organizations, political party and national citizenship. However, we still retain the power of choice in many of them. It is on these kinds of choices that today's readings focus.

Jeremiah places two sources of guidance before the people—namely, human ingenuity and divine law. Today's first reading is a classic example of wisdom teaching. With all the possibilities available to us, to whom do we listen? Whose direction will we follow? Both Jeremiah and the psalm response answer these questions by describing the good fortune of a particular choice: Blessed is the one who "delights in the law of the Lord." The outcome of choosing this way is a meaningful and fruitful life. The consequence of the opposite decision is emptiness and barrenness. What is your choice?

At the heart of Jesus' ministry was an invitation to join and spread the reign of God. Acceptance of this invitation could at times exact a dear price. Using metaphoric language, he sketched the blessings and the woes that would follow acceptance or rejection of that invitation. Again, the decision is ours. What is your choice?

A missionary in the gold miner camps of the old Southwest chose his text from the Beatitudes. When the sermon ended, a rusty voice was heard from the back: "If that's what it means to have God bless me, I think I'll pass." The man had a point. When you read the list of "blessing-ees" it sounds like a mixed bag of suffering and horror - hunger, weeping, hatred, persecution. Who wants to live a life so filled with misery?

We do. To be a Christian is to be a social outsider. Jesus taught that if we serve God the world will treat us as traitors. Everything we stand for, humility, service, charity, is at war with what the world wants: fame, power, glory. We have declared ourselves rebels, swearing devotion to a foreign King who has an entirely different set of laws. And it is this eternal, merciful King who has promised us reward for the battle we are waging. This hope of everlasting reward sustains us when we are battle weary and scarred. When the prisons of life seem too much to bear it is His voice of comfort that carries us through. We are willing traitors, rebels joyously suffering for our cause. Why? The celebration will begin with a presentation by Dr. Bill Keimig at 4:00 PM on "Guiding Children in the Ways of the Faith." (Each of us is called to witness to the faith. Dr. Keimig will provide a way of leading children to a lifelong relationship with Jesus. His advice will be especially helpful for parents, grandparents, catechists, teachers, pastors, and anyone else who has children in their lives.) Sunday Mass, offered by Bishop Jeffrey M. Monforton, will follow at 5:30 PM. After the Mass, each household will be invited to come forward for an individual blessing from Bishop Monforton! RSVP is encouraged to help plan for the meal. "Blessed are they who mourn," Jesus tells us in the second beatitude delivered at his Sermon on the Mount, "for they will be comforted" (Mt 5:4).

So what is comfort? And who offers that comfort? As a parish music and liturgy director for the past 35 years, my wife was frequently the one who met with grieving family members or friends to plan the funeral or memorial Mass for a departed loved one. But for her, this portion of her ministry involved much more than suggesting appropriate choices for music and Scripture readings. It involved presence.

As one who herself had experienced the loss of parents, a sibling and other relatives and friends, she understood the importance of being physically present to family members and friends who were in various stages of their own grieving process. By meeting with them, or speaking with them on the phone, she not only learned more about the departed as well as the family and friends left behind; she built a connection — a trust, really — with these family members. A connection that told them, "Someone cares about you, someone feels your pain, someone is here to walk with you, give you hope and help you move forward. In some cases, the family had been away from church for some time and were, to put it bluntly, clueless about what could and couldn't be done at a funeral Mass. But for my wife, this was a chance not only to educate but, in a very real sense, to evangelize — not by browbeating them about why they hadn't been coming to church, but to remind them that they were always welcome in the house of the Lord who is always present in their lives.

By learning more about what mattered to these individuals, my wife was better able to serve their needs, by being what all who serve this church are called to be: the loving face of God, and the gentle hands of Jesus who helps to raise the lowly, heal the brokenhearted and, yes, comfort those who mourn. Her efforts were reflected in the numerous thank-you cards, calls and letters she received from the family of the deceased in the days after the Mass. Many of the messages spoke of the comfort and peace that those attending experienced from the Mass. And many of these people returned on All Souls' Day when our parish held an annual "Mass of Remembrance" to honor those who had died during the previous 12 months. This liturgy, coordinated by my wife, involved the assistance of dedicated parishioners who created the environment, facilitated the lighting of candles in memory of the departed and hosted a reception after Mass in the parish hall.

Such service is addressed in the bereavement ministry training that many dioceses offer for clergy, religious and lay ministers who serve in their parishes, schools and hospitals. Often coordinated through the diocesan Catholic Cemeteries office, this training addresses how the local community can best serve the needs of those who mourn — to be the blessing, the presence, the comfort of which Jesus speaks in his Sermon on the Mount. We know, too, that mourning "loss" does not simply refer to the death of a loved one. It can also mean the loss of a job, or a business, or time spent with family and friends, or good health — a reality that the coronavirus pandemic has driven home quite vividly the past two years. As Catholics, we are challenged to respond to loss in a way that offers support, hope and strength to those who mourn. We do that by being as present to those who mourn in our midst as Jesus was that day in Galilee.
